
Report on Bahrain

Bahrain is ranked at 10th position on the 2011 Financial Secrecy Index. This ranking is based on a combination of its secrecy score and a scale weighting based on its share of the global market for offshore financial services.

Bahrain has been assessed with 78 secrecy points out of a potential 100, which places it towards the top of the secrecy scale (see chart 1 below).

Bahrain accounts for under 1 per cent of the global market for offshore financial services, making it a tiny player compared with other secrecy jurisdictions (see chart 2 below).



Part 1: Telling the story

Bahrain emerged as a major regional financial centre when it launched Offshore Banking Units in 1973, and <u>soon benefited</u> from the oil price rise, as well as the Lebanese civil war which displaced a significant part of its banking system to Bahrain, helping it overtake Beirut as the banking and financial hub of the Middle East. It has come to specialise especially in Islamic finance.


Bahrain constitutes another surprise in the 2011 Financial Secrecy Index, normally overshadowed in the discourse by its better-known regional rival Dubai. However, with a very high secrecy score of 78 and a large financial centre in regional terms, Bahrain is clearly a jurisdiction of great concern. It is assessed with particularly weak scores for knowledge of beneficial ownership, corporate transparency, the efficiency of tax regulation and antimoney laundering. It also suffers from concerns about financial regulation, concerns about money laundering, and governance more generally.

Next steps for Bahrain

Bahrain's 78 per cent secrecy score shows that it must still make major progress in offering satisfactory financial transparency¹. If it wishes to play a full part in the modern financial community and to impede and deter illicit financial flows, including flows originating from tax evasion, aggressive tax avoidance practices, corrupt practices and criminal activities, it should take action on the points noted where it falls short of acceptable international standards. Part 2: Secrecy Scores

The secrecy score of 78 per cent for Bahrain has been computed by assessing the jurisdiction's performance on the 15 Key Financial Secrecy Indicators, listed below.



The numbers on the horizontal axis of the bar chart on the left refer to the Key Financial Secrecy Indicators (KFSI). The presence of a blue bar indicates a positive answer, as does blue text in the KFSI list below. The presence of a red bar indicates a negative answer as does red text in the KFSI list. Where the jurisdiction's performance partly, but not fully complies with a Key Financial Secrecy Indicator, the text is coloured violet in the list below (combination of red and blue).
