
## **Report on Italy**

Italy is ranked at 36th position on the 2011 Financial Secrecy Index. This ranking is based on a combination of its secrecy score and a scale weighting based on its share of the global market for offshore financial services.

Italy has been assessed with 49 secrecy points out of a potential 100, which it in the lower mid range of the secrecy scale (see chart 1 below).

Italy accounts for slightly under 1 per cent of the global market for offshore financial services, making it a tiny player compared with other secrecy jurisdictions (see chart 2 below).




## Next steps for Italy

Italy's 49 per cent secrecy score shows that it must still make major progress in offering satisfactory financial transparency<sup>1</sup>. If it wishes to play a full part in the modern financial community and to impede and deter illicit financial flows, including flows originating from tax evasion, aggressive tax avoidance practices, corrupt practices and criminal activities, it should take action on the points noted where it falls short of acceptable international standards. ## **Secrecy Scores**

The secrecy score of 49 per cent for Italy has been computed by assessing the jurisdiction's performance on the 15 Key Financial Secrecy Indicators, listed below.



The numbers on the horizontal axis of the bar chart on the left refer to the Key Financial Secrecy Indicators (KFSI). The presence of a blue bar indicates a positive answer, as does blue text in the KFSI list below. The presence of a red bar indicates a negative answer as does red text in the KFSI list. Where the jurisdiction's performance partly, but not fully complies with a Key Financial Secrecy Indicator, the text is coloured violet in the list below (combination of red and blue).

This paper draws on key data collected on Italy. Our data sources include regulatory reports, legislation, regulation and news available at 31.12.2010<sup>2</sup>. The full data set is available <u>here</u><sup>3</sup>. Our assessment is based on the 15 Key Financial Secrecy Indicators (KFSIs, below), reflecting the legal and financial arrangements of Italy. Details of these indicators are noted in the following table and all background data can be found on the <u>Mapping Financial</u> <u>Secrecy web site</u><sup>4</sup>. This data is the basis on which the <u>Financial Secrecy Index</u><sup>5</sup> is compiled.

8.	Efficiency of Tax Administration: Does the tax administration use taxpayer identifiers for analysing information effectively, and is there a large taxpayer unit?
	Italy uses appropriate tools for effectively analysing tax related information
9.	Avoids Promoting Tax Evasion: Does the jurisdiction grant unilateral tax credits for foreign tax payments?
	Italy avoids promoting tax evasion via a tax credit system
10.	Harmful Legal Vehicles: Does the jurisdiction allow cell companies and trusts with flee clauses?
	Italy partly allows harmful legal vehicles

11.	Anti-Money Laundering: Does the jurisdiction comply with the FATF recommendations?

	Italy partly complies with international anti-money laundering standards
12.	Automatic Information Exchange: Does the jurisdiction participate fully in Automatic
	Information Exchange such as the European Savings Tax Directive?
	Italy participates fully in Automatic Information Exchange
13.	Bilateral Treaties: Does the jurisdiction have at least 60 bilateral treaties providing for
	broad information exchange, covering all tax matters, or is it part of the European
	Council/OECD convention?
	Italy has at least 60 bilateral agreements complying with basic OECD requirements
14.	International Transparency Commitments: Has the jurisdiction ratified the five most
	relevant international treaties relating to financial transparency?
	Italy has partly ratified relevant international treaties relating to financial transparency
15.	International Judicial Cooperation: Does the jurisdiction cooperate with other states on
	money laundering and other criminal issues?
	Italy cooperates with other states on money laundering and other criminal issues
